



Library Development Services to Libraries 1999-2001

As the corporate library for Washington State government, we deliver information services to the legislature and state government. As a leader in information policy, we partner with libraries and other entities to provide ready and equitable public access to information.

Legislative District #18: Direct Services to Local Libraries

Libraries in this District include school libraries and:

- Fort Vancouver Regional Library – Battle Ground, Ridgefield, Woodland
- Public Libraries in Kalama and Kelso
- Lewis County Law Library
- Lower Columbia College
- Timberland Regional Library - Winlock, Skalkum
- Cowlitz County Law Library

Libraries in this District have received \$1,150,210 as a result of Washington State Library services and programs during the past three years:

Grants to Individual Libraries or Library Systems (\$298,147)

- \$287,816 in Connectivity, Early Learning, Off the Shelf, and Technology Enhancement grants - Castle Rock School District, Fort Vancouver Regional Library,* Kalama Public Library, Kelso Public Library, LaCenter School District
- \$6,700 in Training Opportunities - Fort Vancouver Regional Library*
- \$3,631 in Continuing Education grants - Fort Vancouver Regional Library*, Kelso Public Library, Lower Columbia College, Monticello Middle School, Timberland Regional Library,* Woodland Middle/High School Library

Online Periodical Databases Access Subsidies (subsidy is matched by the local library) (\$97,321)

- Non-profit schools also received subsidies through their local Educational Service District

Training Provided by or Coordinated by the Washington State Library

240 individuals were trained in: working with pre-school children, effective reference services, diversity, electronic and virtual reference services, information literacy, customer service, digital imaging, information technology, planning, and effective trusteeship. (132 were from Ft. Vancouver Regional Library which crosses legislative district boundaries)

Advancing Library Services Statewide

The Washington State Library (WSL) is the only agency in Washington that is specifically designated to assist libraries and to ensure that residents of the entire state have access to library and information services. State Library staff members work in partnership with statewide advisory committees to plan and implement programs, provide training, grants, and consulting services aimed at the development, improvement, and enhancement of all public and non-profit libraries in the state.

General Consulting

WSL staff provides in-depth research and advice for libraries and government in areas such as: legal and governance issues, development of policies and services, relationships between boards and government officials, board responsibilities and interrelationships, setting up library districts, and other service issues. WSL employees develop, conduct, and facilitate continuing education retreats for library staff and boards of trustees. WSL staff facilitated a group purchase access to online databases, saving libraries approximately 8.3 million (January 2001-June 2002).

Information Technology (IT) Consulting

WSL provides specialized IT consulting services for libraries throughout the state. Areas of expertise include network infrastructure, computing hardware and software, and the federal E-rate/CIPA program qualifying libraries for both E-rate discounts and LSTA grants. The Library's IT consultants have taken a leadership role in connecting public libraries to the statewide K-20 network, a high-speed data and video network now serving educational institutions throughout the State. WSL is also working with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to bring computer hardware, software, and training to many Washington public libraries.

Interlibrary Loan

During 1999-2001, the Washington State Library provided the following materials to Washington libraries: 20,013 books and microfilm, 20,799 photocopies of journal articles.
